

Rebels heading to the Fargodome

Schauer surpasses 2000 yards rushing

Eagle Valley (10-0) stayed undefeated as they won their first two playoff games to advance to Friday's section final at the Fargodome. Both games were in doubt at half-time, but the Rebels got a spark and pulled away for victories. Eagle Valley will play Wheaton-Herman-Norcross at 12:30 p.m. this Friday at the Fargodome. Wheaton (9-1) defeated Onamia 50-12 in their semi-final game. This will be a tough matchup for the Rebels. Wheaton's only loss comes at the hands of Clinton-Graceville (10-0) 20-18 early in the season.

Eagle Valley 48 — Bertha-Hewitt 26

Last Tuesday the Rebels took on the visiting Bertha-Hewitt Bears in the first round of the section playoffs. The Bears came to play and it was a close game until the Rebels put the game away in the fourth quarter.

Jake Schauer got the Rebels going early as he broke a few tackles and raced 46 yards for a touchdown on the third play of the game. The Bears got on the scoreboard also in the first quarter after completing a fourth down and 17 on a 41-yard pass. The touchdown came five plays later for a 6-6 tie. Schauer broke another run for 38 yards and a touchdown. Again the extra point failed and it was 12-6.

In the second quarter, Tyler Oftedahl hit Jerod Nelson for a 20-yard pass and an 18-6 score. The Bears came right back with their own TD and did convert the extra point for an 18-14 halftime score.

The second half found the Rebels scoring two unanswered third quarter touchdowns. Oftedahl took it in from three yards out for a touchdown. The highlight of the drive was a 36-yard pass to Tate Benning. Oftedahl hit Logan Riedel for the extra point.

The Rebels got the ball right back and went to work. A pass from Oftedahl to Taylor Bailey was good for 33 yards. Two plays later the duo hooked up again on a 12-yard TD pass. The score was now

32-14.

In the fourth quarter, the Bears answered with a touchdown to close the gap to 32-20. The Rebels came right back as Nelson took a handoff around the end and dived into the end zone on a 15-yard run. Luke Mock ran over the extra point. The score was now 40-20.

Again the Bears answered with their own 6-yard touchdown run to close the gap to 40-26.

The Rebels put the game away when Schauer scored his third touchdown on an 8-yard run. Benning caught the two point conversion for the final score 48-26.

This was a hard fought tough hitting game. The Bears had over 300 yards of offense with most of those yards coming on the ground. The Rebels also picked up almost 400 yards of offense with Schauer again having a nice game with 218 yards on 27 carries.

Oftedahl was 7 or 15 for 123 yards and two touchdowns. Benning, Nelson and Bailey each had two receptions.

Defensively the Rebels spent a good part of the night on the field as the Bears ran over 70 plays with most of them on the ground. Leading the Rebels on defense was senior Blake Borst with 22 tackles and a fumble recovery. The Rebels recovered three more fumbles and an onside kick. Oftedahl had two of those and Nelson and Schauer each had one. John Wood, Derek Meyer and Tyson Eckel each had a QB sack on the night as well.

Eagle Valley 38 — Isle 20

Last Saturday the (7-2) Isle Huskies came to Eagle Bend to take on the (9-0) Rebels in a section semifinal game. Isle is a good football team with some talented players. This was a see-saw game for the first three quarters.

Isle scored first on a seven play 88-yard drive, ending with a 28-yard TD pass. With the Rebels trailing 6-0, the boys started their own drive from their own 37-yard line. A key third down conversion of 11 yards was a pass from Of-

tedahl to Meyer to keep the drive alive. Mock ran up the middle for 12 yards and the tying TD. Oftedahl passed it to Bailey for an 8-6 lead.

Bailey made a nice interception on the next Husky drive and returned it to the 43-yard line. Schauer ran for 34. Mock ran for 22 and then Schauer ran for 1 and the Rebels had the lead. Mock also ran across the extra point. Isle came back with a 12 play, 79-yard drive to close the scoring at half-time 16-12.

The third quarter saw Isle dominate in ball possession. Isle was forced to punt on their first possession of the second half. The Rebels then fumbled on their first play and Isle had it back. The defense stopped the Huskies after a nine play drive that ended with a fourth down incomplete pass. At the end of the third quarter, a fourth down pass was just over the defenders arms and into the hands of Benning. The score was now 22-12.

Isle marched down the field in nine plays to score the TD and get the extra point for a 22-20 score.

The Rebels needed to drive the ball down the field. That is what they did. Four plays and 53 yards later the Rebels had scored. Schauer was the work horse with runs of 37 and 21 yards. The last 21 was the TD. Schauer also scored the important extra point that gave the Rebels a two score lead at 30-20.

On Isle's next play a long pass was intercepted by Bailey and returned 30 yards to the Rebel 47-yard line. Mock showed excellent power as he carried the next two times for 7 and 21 yards. Schauer carried it again down to the one yard line and Mock took it in from one yard out. Mock also ran across the extra point for the final of 38-20.

In that fourth quarter, the Rebel offensive line took over the game. They gave Mock and Schauer holes to run through and both backs showed their power and speed in picking up yards.

Again the Rebels picked up huge chunks of yards in the game. The Rebels rushed for 371 yards with Schauer passing the 2000 mark with 294 yards on 30 carries. He now has an amazing 2286 yards with 23 touchdowns. Jake will be the first to credit his offensive line consisting of Blake Borst, John Wood, Cody Kent, Tyson Eckel, Jerod Nelson and his fullback Luke Mock. Derek Meyer and Logan Riedel also help with the blocking.

QB Tyler Oftedahl threw the ball 15 times, completing 7 for 94 yards and 1 touchdown. Benning scored his 7th TD of the year on that 39-yard pass.

The defense came up with some big stops and plays in that fourth quarter including Taylor Bailey's two interceptions. With the Huskies running an amazing 71 plays from scrimmage, there were plenty of tackles and assists for the Rebels. Blake Borst tied his own record with 26 tackles. Tate Benning from his safety position came up with 17 tackles. Jerod Nelson and John Wood had 15 and 13 tackles in the game.

Tigers set to take on Mahnomen in Section Finals

The Browerville Tigers opened up Section 6A playoffs against the Eagles from New York Mills. The Tigers defense was ready to play. We played the Eagles a week and a half ago so our defensive scheme was pretty fresh in our memories. We made a few adjustments from the prior game and we executed the game plan well as we held the Eagles to 66 yards rushing in the first half and 6 yards passing. The second half was even better as the Tigers were able to hold the Eagles to 46 yards rushing and 4 yards passing.

On offense we only ran 18 plays in the first half, but we did rush for 189 yards. The second half was even less as we only ran 12 total plays for 58 yards. Ben Dreher ran a punt back in the third quarter. Because of this we only had the ball for a total of three plays in the third quarter. Overall we played very well the entire game.

Seth Kellen rushed 9 times for 114 yards and two TDs. Dreher rushed 7 times for 90 yards and one TD. He also had two punt returns for TDs, one was for 55 yards and the other was

for 45 yards. Both the returns were set up with great blocking down field as perfect walls were set by the punt team. Trenton Wollenburg rushed 4 times for 14 yards, Makenzie Asmus rushed 3 times for 13 yards, Benton Johnson rushed 1 time for 2 yards, Adam Sutlief had 1 rush for 1 yard, Jackson Polack rushed 2 times for 1 yard and Marcel Franek rushed 1 time for 22 yards. The Tigers rushed 29 times for 257 yards.

The Tigers second round game pitted the Tigers against the Huskies from Pillager. Pillager got the ball to start and moved down the field for two first downs passing and running. The Tigers came up with two huge stops, one on third down and the next on fourth down to halt the Huskies first drive. The Tigers took the ball and went 66 yards on their first drive. An eleven play drive was capped off by a 10-yard run from Dreher.

We had to overcome a few penalties on the drive and it really set the tone of the game from the stop on defense, to overcoming penalties and missed blocks. The Huskies called four or five blitzes that worked to perfection for them as our lineman didn't have their heads up and missed

the blitz.

The Tigers stopped the Huskies again and followed it with a six play, 44-yard drive fueled by Wollenburg's 21-yard scamper and an 11-yard reception where he broke two tackles to gain a fist down. Kellen would eventually score on a 1-yard run.

Pillager came back through the air and on the ground to make the score 13-6 Tigers.

This is where the Tigers took over. The offensive line began to win the line of scrimmage and we were able to pick off the blitz and begin to open holes. We rushed for 87 yards and two TDs in the first quarter and 194 yards and 4 TDs in the second quarter. Dreher had 3 TDs and Wollenburg had one. Dreher's TDs were for 27, 52 and 10 yards while Wollenburg's came on a 16-yard run where he had to run over two players from five yards out to power his way into the end zone.

In the second half, the Tigers received the opening kick off and were driving the ball down the field, but a fumble stopped the drive. That was the last time Wollenburg and Dreher would see the field on this night.

After the Huskies had one set of downs, both teams emptied the benches and the second and third teams played the rest of the way.

Adam Sutlief scored as he powered his way into the end zone on a 1-yard run. In the fourth quarter, Polak read the veer perfectly and scored on a 21-yard run around the end.

For the game the Tigers rushed the ball 58 times for 505 yards and 3 receptions for 23 yards.

The defense played very well again giving up 9 yards rushing in the first quarter, 18 yards in the second, 41 yards in the third quarter and 78 yards in the fourth quarter. We did give up 93 yards passing in the game, but Kellen was able to intercept two passes to stop the Huskies drives.

"At times we were overcommitted to stopping the run and it cost us in passing yardage. We were able to stop them when we needed to most and get the ball back to our offense."

The Tigers will now move on to face Mahnomen in Fargo on Friday at 3 p.m. We will have to play a perfect game if we are to move on to the state tournament.

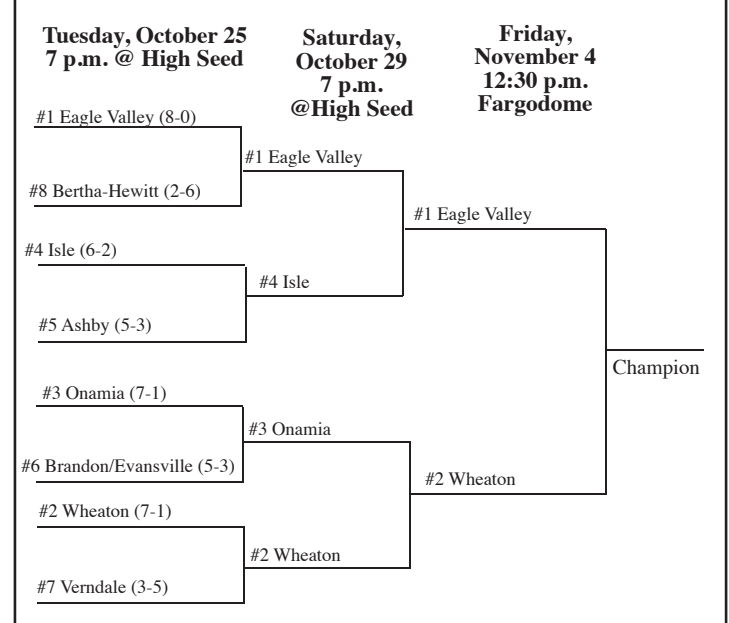

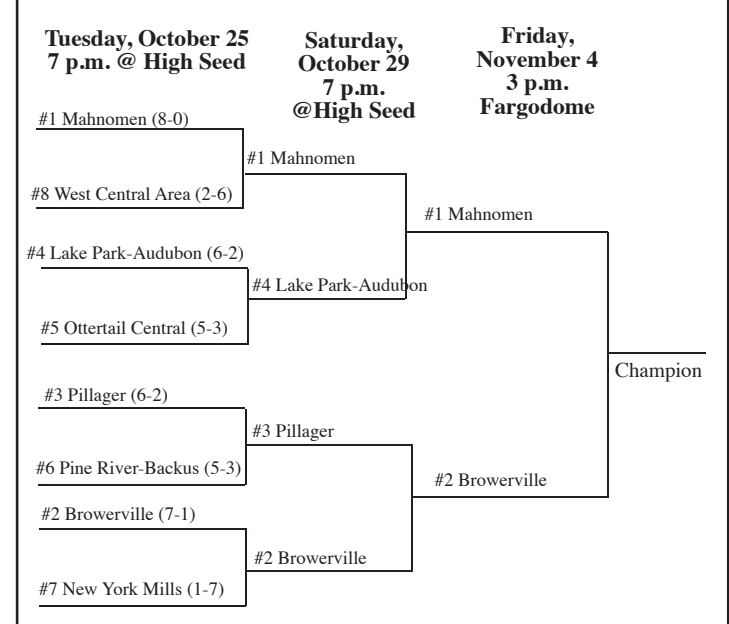
